We are so deeply grateful for your support in a year of growth an improvement! In 2023, you served more vulnerable children and families in Kenya than ever. We are constantly amazed at your faithfulness and generosity. All the numbers in this report represent deep transformational change in 2023:

- On the new **playground** you built, street kids are experiencing safe childhood again.
- With staff you trained in **parenting strategies**, moms and dads are learning practical lessons in their homes on family connections, expectations, and discipline.
- Through **business training and seed money**, you've helped parents afford hot meals and school fees for their families.

Did you know you've also helped forge a **national movement** in Kenya this year? Traditional orphanages are now required to embrace a family-based care such as we have been providing for 10 years, Your Shelter has become a beacon, training others in the region. Countless children will be liberated, rehabilitated, and reunited with loving families!

What's next? Our 2024 priorities include secondary **trauma training** to empower our staff, and a new **case management system** to reduce relapse. We are also looking forward to expanding our **financial empowerment** program, and **a new guest house** so you can come see your impact!

## **Our Approach**

#### **RESCUE**

Our social workers reach out directly to boys living on the streets and build relationships with them. They invite them to the Shelter, where they are provided with clean clothes, medical care, food, a warm bed and loving adults to care for them.

#### **REHABILITATE**

At the Shelter, boys experience group and individual counseling, life skills training, remedial academic work, leadership opportunities, and spiritual care. They also participate in normal family chores (milking cows, washing clothes, helping prepare food), sports, hiking and art.

#### REUNITE

Staff works to understand why a boy left home and trace his family. They identify safe home options and assess to make sure both the family and the boy are prepared for reunification. If the family is prepared to provide basic needs and school, the boy is reunited with his family. Shelter social workers continue to visit at home and school to make sure the child is progressing well.

#### **EMPOWER**

We empower vulnerable families to PREVENT their children from returning to or living in the streets, child labor, or underage marriage. YOU provide parent curriculum, microbusiness training, technical training, and school fees.

## **Family Empowerment Program**

18 families

This year, you launched our GRADUATION APPROACH to financial empowerment. Selected at-risk families were trained in financial literacy, entrepreneurship, business skills, savings and loans groups, and developing a business plan.

Why? PREVENT RELAPSE! As we've rescued children and prepared them to return home, many families struggle to meet basic needs. This leads children to begging on the streets,

dropping out of school, drugs, gangs, and criminal activity. Children thrive in safe homes with stable incomes!

We hired an amazing head of department and started 2 cohorts with 18 families total. Many are finding success! Esther can now afford to send all her grandchildren to school. Jackson can now feed his family more than one hot meal each day. We plan to train 40 more families in 2024.

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Intensive group training in financial literacy, microbusiness, & savings groups.

#### **Kick Start**

Seed money for supplies to start a business. Support funds provide school fees & food.

#### 6 months

Check-ins and business coaching.
Support funds taper off as income grows.

#### 12 months

Mentorships conclude and a a self-sufficient family is together and thriving!

Our contractor repurposed natural materials and included elements for our older boys, including seesaws, monkey bars, swings, and more. Safe PLAY is an important part of our program as children heal from trauma on the streets.










## New outdoor classroom

### **NOT JUST THE BOYS**

#### SUCCESS STORIES ARE EVERYWHERE





Shelter Yetu focuses our rescue efforts of boys because of the high number of boys living on the streets.

However, our social workers are always looking for opportunities to serve and empower girls in the community. Recently, one of our social workers conducted a home visit with family where he had recently reunified a young boy.

The social worker found fourteen-year-old Amani\* at home. She dropped out of school in fourth grade when her parents separated and her mother began to struggle with finances. As they were talking, Amani shared her desire to go back to school.

Amani admitted to feeling lonely at home when other children her age are in school.

She shared that older men in the community are hitting on her and pressuring her toward early marriage. Relatives are also pressuring her to engage in domestic work in exchange for food.

But Amani dreams of a different life. And now, because of your support, Shelter Yetu has supported Amani to return to school! She is so excited and dreams of being able to support her mother once she has finished her studies and gotten a good job.
